Enrolling your Child for School

A' Clàradh ur Pàiste san Sgoil



Children who will be five on or before 28 February 2019 are eligible to be enrolled for Primary 1 starting August 2018. Enrolment will take place in the week commencing 29 January 2018.

Which children are automatically admitted to primary school?

Only children whose fifth birthday falls between 1 March 2018 and the last day of February 2019 will automatically be admitted to Primary 1 in August 2018.

What is deferred entry?

If your child's birthday is between September 2018 and February 2019 (e.g. still 4 years old on the school start date in August 2018) you are entitled to defer entry to primary school if you believe your child is not ready for school. Only children whose birthdays fall in January or February will be considered for funding for a subsequent year at nursery, unless there are special circumstances. When do I enrol my child for school?

If your child is due to start school in August 2018, they should be enrolled at their catchment area primary school. We recommend that you complete the online form at

Which is my local school?

Each school has a defined geographical catchment area (with the exception of denominational and Gaelic Medium schools) and normally your child will attend your local catchment area primary school. School catchment maps are available online, you can search for your nearest schools at

Can I request a school other than my local school?

You may make a placing request for your child to attend a school other than your local school. Information on placing requests can be found on the website. It is important, however, that your child is registered at their local catchment area school in advance of making a placing request application. Please note too that if a placing request is granted, transport is the responsibility of parents.



What are the arrangements for starting school?

Primary 1 pupils should attend the full infant day from day 1 of the school session in August 2018.

There is, however, some flexibility for Head Teachers to have a reduced infant day for Primary 1 pupils for the first two weeks of the school session.

Detailed arrangements for this will be agreed within Associated School Groups in order to avoid any local, practical difficulties.

Head Teachers will ensure that arrangements are communicated to parents at the earliest opportunity.

How can I get Additional Support for my child?

Parents who feel that their child may require additional support for learning are advised to contact staff at their child's school in the first instance. Is School Transport available?

If your child will be eligible for free school transport then a transport request form **must** be submitted no later than the 28th February 2018.

What School Meals are provided?

All food and drinks served meet the requirements of The Schools (Health Promotion and Nutrition) (Scotland) Act 2007. All Primary 1 to 3 pupils are entitled to free school meals and no application form is required, however an application will still be required if you wish to apply for a school clothing grant.

Bilingualism and Gaelic Medium Education

Dà-chànanas is Foghlam tro Mheadhan na Gàidhlig

Gaelic Medium Education is a tried and tested way of ensuring that children learn to speak Gaelic and reap the benefits of being bilingual at an early age. It is available to children from both Gaelic and non-Gaelic speaking homes. Enrolment to Gaelic Medium Education can take place at Primary 1 stage, or thereafter, between Gaelic Medium Primary Schools/classes. The Highland Council is one of the leading local authorities in Scotland providing Gaelic Medium Education. Gaelic Medium Education represents the best hope for reversing the decline of Gaelic in the Highlands, especially if it is supported by opportunities for young people to use Gaelic in the home and community. The Council is committed to continuing to develop Gaelic Medium Education in pre-school and primary schools as well as expanding Gaelic Medium Education in the secondary sector.

Gaelic Medium Education is provided in 19 primary schools across the Council area (detailed below). We also continue to develop Gaelic Learning in Primary schools through the provision of a Primary Language Learning programme. Gaelic Medium subject teaching and Gaelic language courses, for both fluent speakers and/or learners, are offered in a total of 16 secondary schools.

In addition, we also provide support for parents and other learners in communities through a coordinated system of adult tuition including a progressive tuition plan.
